I would like to acknowledge all the students and staff from both Mercy College and Parade for their involvement in the show.


Enrolment Deadline Reminder for Younger Siblings of Current Students

Last week, we had our annual Staff Formation Day. This day was a crucial step in our ongoing commitment to fostering an inclusive environment where every member of our community feels valued and respected.

The day featured compelling presentations from experts, who trained staff on best practices in the inclusion of LGBTQIA+ and diverse young people, the celebration of Eucharist, and the development of an inclusive curriculum.

The day was underpinned by the Catholic Social Teaching principle of Human Dignity. This principle reaffirms that each individual within our community is created in the 'image and likeness of God', and is thus deserving of dignity, respect, and love.

This core belief underpins our efforts to embrace diversity and create an inclusive environment where everyone can thrive academically, socially, and spiritually.

Education about inclusivity is crucial in a Catholic school because it aligns with our core values of compassion, dignity, and respect for all individuals. As a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition, we are inspired by the four Touchstones offered in the Charter, one of which is Inclusive Community.

This Touchstone calls us to develop a school community that is "accepting and welcoming, fostering right relationships and committed to the common good."

By fostering an inclusive environment, we honour this Touchstone, as well as the teachings of Christ, who embraced and valued every person.

In addition to meeting our mission as a Catholic school, inclusivity education is also an integral part of meeting our Child Safety requirements, as set out in the Child Wellbeing and Safety Act. Child Safe Standard 5.3 requires that all Victorian schools pay particular attention to the needs of vulnerable children and young people, such as LGBTQIA+ community members, and take action to support children who are experiencing vulnerability.

Inspired by the inclusive spirit of Edmund Rice, who dedicated his life to educating and uplifting marginalised communities, and by the Child Safe Standards, our Staff Formation Day was another step forward in our commitment to ensuring that our College reflects these values.

From the Dean of Learning -Years 7 to 9

Release of NAPLAN results

Families of students in Years 7 and 9 should have received their NAPLAN results in the mail. In the package, you will find a brochure that explains how to interpret the results.

The brochure is available online here <u>https://nap.edu.au/docs/</u> <u>default-source/naplan/isr-parent-carer-faq.pdf</u>

When you receive your child's results, you will see that they have been placed in one of four proficiency levels: Exceeding; Developing; Strong; and Needs Additional Support.

• Exceeding

The student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.

• Strong

The student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.

• Developing

The student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.

Needs Additional Support

The student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.

These proficiency levels are designed to give you a general sense of how your child has performed on each test. As these results are only one aspect of the College's assessment and reporting process, families are encouraged to continue to regularly view their child's results on PAM to fully understand their progress.

At the College, we use the NAPLAN results to assist with evaluating our teaching programs and to identify areas that may require targeted intervention. Subject teachers will be able to access the results to inform the way that they support students in their classes.

Homework Club

Homework Club continues to run each Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon in the NLC. We strongly encourage all students to consider attending, especially our students in Years 7 to 9.

Students can attend to receive help with work they are completing in class, or to complete their homework knowing that a knowledgeable teacher or learning support officer is around to help if they get 'stuck'.



Premier's VCE Award – Julian Borg

At last month's Premier's VCE Awards, Julian Borg received a Study Award for Biology. Julian accelerated in Units 3 and 4 Biology last year and achieved a perfect study score of 50.

Last year, 13,869 students completed VCE Biology, and Julian was one of only seven students recognised with this prestigious Study Award.

Both myself and Dr Janette Berglez attended the ceremony to celebrate Julian's significant achievement. Dr Berglez was Julian's Biology teacher. Julian's parents also attended the ceremony and expressed their sincere appreciation of Janette's support for Julian.

Julian's achievement is an inspiration to all students, particularly his VCE peers who are approaching their final exams in the coming months.

Trial Exams for Unit 3 and Unit 4 Students

A reminder to all students undertaking Unit 3 and 4 subjects that all subjects are aiming to complete their courses by the end of Week 8 this term. Week 9 will be a revision week, with the Unit 3 and 4 Trial Exams commencing on Friday 13 September and concluding on Friday 20 September.

To replicate the VCAA exam timetable, exams will begin as early as 9.00am, and conclude as late as 5.00pm.

Wednesday morning Study Hall periods and after-school Nano Nagle tutoring are two simple ways to assist students in managing their workloads in the lead-up to this busy time.

It has been highlighted to the students the importance of these trial exams in helping to prepare both individuals and each subject cohort, for the upcoming VCAA exams.

Students should begin revision for trial exams now. In this edition of the *Newsletter*, and the following two editions, some evidence-based revision techniques will be outlined:

- 21 August: Active Recall and Practice Testing
- 4 September: Dual Coding and Elaborative Interrogation

Spaced Repetition

What is Spaced Repetition?

Spaced repetition is a study technique that involves reviewing material at increasing intervals over time. This method leverages the psychological spacing effect, which shows that our brains are better at retaining information when we spread out our learning sessions.

How to Implement Spaced Repetition

Start by breaking down your study material into manageable chunks. After your initial study session, review the material after one day. Then, revisit it after three days, a week, and so on. The key is to gradually increase the intervals between reviews. There are various tools and apps available, such as Quizlet, which can help you schedule and manage these review sessions efficiently.

Why It Works

Research has consistently shown that spaced repetition is more effective than cramming. By repeatedly exposing yourself to the material over time, you strengthen your memory and understanding, making it easier to recall information when you need it most.

Interleaved Practice

What is Interleaved Practice?

Interleaved practice involves mixing different subjects or types of problems within a single study session, rather than focusing on one topic at a time.

This technique contrasts with traditional "blocked" practice, where you study one subject thoroughly before moving on to the next.

How to Implement Interleaved Practice

To implement interleaved practice, alternate between different subjects or problem types during your study sessions. For example, instead of spending an entire hour on math followed by an hour on English, spend 20 minutes on math, then 20 minutes on English, and then 20 minutes on another subject. The key is to mix up the content, so your brain is continually challenged to retrieve and apply different types of information.

Why It Works

Research has shown that interleaved practice enhances problem-solving skills and adaptability. By constantly switching between different topics, your brain is forced to work harder to retrieve the correct information, leading to deeper learning and better retention. This technique helps you become more versatile in applying knowledge across various contexts, which is crucial during exams.

Year 12 VTAC, and SEAS Applications

Year 12 students have been made aware of Open Days being run by Tertiary Institutions and are encouraged to attend as many as they can to make an informed decision regarding their pathway beyond school.

Year 12 students had an assembly on Wednesday 7 August, during their usual Study Hall period, to inform them about the VTAC and SEAS application process.

Students who are seeking further guidance about their postschool pathway should book an appointment with the Careers Advisors.

Parade College Subscribes to School TV which is a site run by some of the leading experts in student wellbeing to assist staff and families in supporting their young people. The most recent special report from SchoolTV focuses on the recent phenomena of Social Media Influencers.

Social Media Influencers

Social media influencers wield significant power, shaping opinions, particularly among young people. However, their impact on youth mental health is concerning. Most recently, the controversial actions and statements of Andrew Tate and his rise to fame, have made him a polarising figure, amassing a significant following of mostly young males.

Educators and families have raised urgent concerns about the damaging nature of Tate's content, worried that his messages may radicalise students and create a generation of young men with regressive and harmful beliefs.

In today's digital world, anyone can be an influencer, exerting influence through their audience relationship.

Comparisons to idealised lives on social media can contribute to feelings of inadequacy, while exposure to inappropriate content and distorted body image perceptions exacerbate the issue. The fast-paced environment inundates young people with information, making them susceptible to certain beliefs and evoke strong emotions. Attention has become a valued commodity, therefore influencers design content to captivate their audiences.

Filtered portrayals of perfect lives create unrealistic expectations often resulting in dissatisfaction. Comparisons with peers intensify insecurities and anxiety.

Social media algorithms may also expose a young person to inappropriate content, fostering negative and divisive narratives which can then lead to cyberbullying and online harassment, further harming their wellbeing.

It is therefore crucial for parents and caregivers to guide a young person's social media use, encourage open communication, and educate them about the realities of social media.

Be curious to comprehend why they might be drawn to radical influencers, like Andrew Tate, and actively seek understanding as part of the solution. Through modelling kindness, respect and positive values, you can help tackle the sway of such influencers, countering unhealthy masculinity and mitigating potential harm.

While not all influencers have a negative impact, it is important to ensure there is a balanced approach between online and offline activities. Emphasise the importance of critical thinking, real-life connections and positive values.

An education strategy to prevent domestic and family violence led by young people for young people.

Flourish Girl: Promoting mental health and emotional intelligence for teenage girls and gender diverse teens in schools.

Girl Power:

Fostering a positive mindset, inner confidence and resilience in girls at a young age, before they embark on their teenage years and are exposed to the powerful world of social media.

Our second group of Year 11 Touchstones classes has embarked on their three-week volunteering journey. This program provides our students with the opportunity to give back to the community while gaining valuable life skills.

Students are engaged in a variety of projects, both onsite and within community groups. On campus, some are dedicating their time to enhancing our school's facilities and environment. Meanwhile, others are working closely with local community organizations, offering their help and making a positive impact.

This initiative is a cornerstone of our educational philosophy, emphasizing the importance of service, empathy, and community involvement.

We are incredibly proud of our Year 11 students for their commitment and enthusiasm in contributing to these meaningful projects.

Some students have found their volunteering with local organisations and others, like Thomas Motta below, have been volunteering for some time.

My volunteering takes place at the Go Kart Club of Victoria, at times that are convenient for me, which is mostly weekends. At the club, I provide support to younger drivers. This support may include walking around the track with them and teaching them where the quickest lines to drive are, as well as providing tips on what to do in certain race situations such as when overtaking or defending against another driver.

I also provide support to drivers regarding the setup of their kart, this may include teaching them how to set up their kart for different conditions and how the changes made to the kart will affect the way they drive.

I believe that others gain knowledge from me that would otherwise take them years to accumulate, which helps fasttrack their racing and enables them to better themselves.

What I have gained includes taking in the many different experiences of people who do the sport I am passionate about, such as where they began, what inspired them to start, and their dreams and goals.

News from La Trobe University

If you want to study an initial teacher education program at La Trobe, our AFTA is a free and on-demand alternative to the CASPer test.

Students should note that the AFTA can only be used for entry into initial teaching education programs at La Trobe. The assessment is divided into five sections, and within each section, students will be provided with three written scenarios, presented one at a time.

The scenarios are randomised, and each section must be completed before a student can progress to the next section. This is an aptitude test that assesses a student's communication, self-regulated learning, teamwork, professionalism, and problem-solving skills.

Monash University will be hosting several Discover Monash events or activities from September to December and students are encouraged to register early.

Monash Teaching Suitability Test (MTeST)

The Monash Teaching Suitability Test (MTeST) is designed for entry into Monash Initial Teacher Education courses only and cannot be used to apply for other institutions. Importantly, this is a free alternative to CASPer.

Students do not need to book in for the test as it is open every day and only takes 15 minutes to complete. The results can take up to three weeks to be processed.
