# **Charter Bus Network**

It is very important we work collectively from home and school discussing the importance of safe travel for all our students to ensure a comfortable journey to and from school.

There have been reported incidents by bus drivers where students are eating and drinking on the buses leaving the buses littered and moving around the vehicle during route to and from school.

We have placed the Bus Code of Conduct on page 16 to read with your son this week if he rides the Charter Bus Network.

#### **Special Report: Smartphones in Schools**

Currently, school policies around the use of electronic devices during school hours vary widely.

Technology does have a role to play in the classroom, but this needs to be facilitated. Personal mobile phones, on the other hand, are proving to be a distraction for students in terms of their access to social media sites, as well as potentially being a source of bullying activities.

There is a growing concern around this issue, and schools also have a legal duty of care to keep students safe and provide them with a secure environment in which to learn. Not only does mobile phone use cause a distraction, but a lack of sleep is a big issue relating to mobile phone use. In addition, there is also the threat of online predators and cyberbullying.

Research shows that one in four children under the age of 12 are being stalked, harassed, or abused.

The challenge is to help young people find a balance and learn to manage their schoolwork, have a social life, and get the good parts out of technology. Mobile phones are changing our young people's behaviour in ways that could not have been predicted.

If you would like to read the report detailing the review of the non-educational use of mobile devices in schools visit the Parade College SchoolTV website. Parade College has a no mobile phone policy.

If students bring their phones to school during school hours or certain school-related activities, the devices are to be turned off and securely stored in their locker fitted with a combination lock. If students are in possession of a mobile phone during school hours the phone is confiscated and stored at Student Services until 3.15pm dismissal.

When a student has multiple breaches of the mobile phone policy parents/carers will be notified by their child's House Leader or Wellbeing Leader.





# From the Dean of Learning -Years 10 to 12

# Trial Exams for Unit 3 and Unit 4 VCE Students

A reminder to all students undertaking Unit 3 and 4 subjects that all subjects are aiming to complete their courses by the start of Week 9 this Term. Week 9 will also see the commencement of Unit 3 and 4 Trial Exams commence on Friday 13 September to Friday 20 September.

Wednesday morning study hall periods and after-school Nano Nagle tutoring are two simple ways to assist boys in managing their workloads in the lead-up to this busy time. It has been highlighted to the students the importance of these trial exams in helping to prepare both individuals and each subject cohort, for the upcoming VCAA exams.

In the last *Newsletter*, two evidence-based revision techniques were introduced: *Spaced Repetition* and *Interleaved Practice*. Below, you will find some information on two revision techniques: Active Recall and Practice Testing. Students should be using these techniques as they prepare for their trial and final exams.

# Active Recall What is Active Recall?

Active recall involves actively stimulating your memory during the learning process, rather than passively reviewing material. This method encourages you to actively retrieve information from your brain, which strengthens your memory and understanding.

# How to Implement Active Recall

To implement active recall, try using flashcards, self-quizzing, or writing down everything you remember about a topic without looking at your notes. For example, after reading a chapter in your textbook, close the book and jot down key points and concepts from memory. Regularly challenge yourself with questions about the material you've studied.

#### Why It Works

Studies show that active recall significantly enhances memory consolidation and retrieval. By forcing your brain to recall

information, you create stronger neural connections, making it easier to remember the material later. This technique is especially effective for improving long-term retention and exam performance.

#### **Practice Testing**

#### What is Practice Testing?

Practice testing involves taking practice exams or quizzes to assess your knowledge and identify areas for improvement. This technique not only tests your recall but also familiarizes you with the exam format and timing.

#### How to Implement Practice Testing

To implement practice testing, use past exam papers, online quizzes, or create your own tests. Schedule regular testing sessions, simulating exam conditions as closely as possible. After completing each test, review your answers and focus on understanding any mistakes.

#### Why It Works

Research indicates that practice testing is one of the most effective ways to improve exam performance and retention. By regularly testing yourself, you enhance your ability to retrieve information and apply it under exam conditions. This repeated retrieval practice strengthens your memory and helps you identify areas where you need further study.

# Year 12 VTAC, SEAS Applications and Choices for **After-School Pathways**

Year 12 students have been made aware of Open Days offered by Tertiary Institutions and are encouraged to attend as many as they can to make an informed decision regarding their pathway beyond school.

All Year 12 students also attended an assembly on the morning of Wednesday 7 August, explaining the application process for applying for Tertiary study as well as the Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) applications. Students are responsible for their own VTAC applications and their SEAS applications (where applicable), with College staff available to assist.

# Diamond Valley Vietnam Veterans Community Memorial Service



# From the Maths Department

A group of Year 11 students in Miss Zhou's VCE Mathematical Methods Unit 2 class recently explored sine and cosine curves using spaghetti in a creative, hands-on activity. The students began by cutting spaghetti pieces to represent the horizontal (cosine) and vertical (sine) distances for specific angles on the unit circle. These measurements allowed them to physically map out the corresponding sine and cosine values.

Afterwards, the spaghetti pieces were arranged along a horizontal axis, forming a visual representation of the sine and cosine curves. This tangible approach helped students visualize how the sine and cosine values change as the angle increases, making the abstract concepts more accessible.

This activity was both engaging and educational, providing a unique way for students to deepen their understanding of circular functions. By physically manipulating the spaghetti and observing the resulting curves, they were able to connect with the material in a more meaningful way.

#### Year 12 VTAC Applications

Students who are planning to apply for University or TAFE in 2025 must create a VTAC account. Students can use the following link to start the process. They will need a USI number and their VCAA number to complete this application. <u>Https://vtac.edu.au/applying/account</u>

VTAC applications are due by Monday 30 September at 5.00pm. Students must pay the \$60 VTAC fee for the application to be processed.

#### **SEAS Applications:**

The Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) covers a range of access and equity programs offered by institutions. SEAS is a single application that is sent to all the courses you apply to. Applications for the 2025 intake are open. Students can meet with Mrs Bult to discuss SEAS applications if required.

#### Early Entry Applications to University

All Students are encouraged to apply for Early Entry programs to university. I have included a link with information relating to universities offering Early Entry programs.

# Italian Excursion to the NGV

Despite the dreary weather on Monday 29 July, students from Years 11 and 12 Italian enjoyed a visit to the National Gallery of Victoria. The visit provided students with the opportunity to learn about the Italian Renaissance through the paintings of various artists displayed in the Gallery.

Currently, the Year 12 class is preparing for their VCAA Italian Oral Examination. This exam requires them to present a topic of their choice to a panel. Our Year 12 class has chosen to talk about the life and work of two female Italian painters: Artemisia Gentileschi and Sofonisba Anguissola. These two artists lived in Italy during the Renaissance, a period marking the revival of Greco-Roman art. The Year 11 class is currently involved in the study of the Renaissance in Italy.

Our excursion started with a guided tour. An NGV educator introduced students to the sites of Venice, Rome and other Italian cities to discover Italian history, culture and life through art.

Students were able to then analyse and discuss Italian paintings and reflect on how they demonstrated cultural and historical ideologies of the Renaissance period.

For the Year 12s, this was also an opportunity to gain important details that will assist them with their discussion at the Oral Examination. Both Years 11 and 12 completed several language tasks at the Gallery which complemented the tour.

The day ended with the group braving the rain and wind and travelling to Brunetti, where students ordered food and drinks and exchanged their thoughts on the experience. This also gave us the opportunity to practice speaking in Italian as a group. The feedback below from the Year 12 cohort was positive, with many saying it will help with their oral exams later in the year.

"Our trip to the NGV was a remarkable, eye-opening experience that will most definitely enhance our ability to speak about female Renaissance painters at the end of the year. It was phenomenal to experience a range of cultural awakenings that widened our perspective of the Italian culture for the rest of our lives."

# **PARADE COLLEGE** Bus Code Of Conduct

The College has a responsibility to address legal requirements imposed by bus companies, which are related to safe travel for our students. By applying for a College Bus service, you have indicated you are aware of the College's Code of Conduct and that you agree to follow its rules.

- 1. Food and drinks must not be consumed on any of the buses at ANY time.
- 2. Any vandalism is unacceptable. Students are required to report any pre-existing damage to the bus driver and the nearest Parade College Staff Member.
- 3. College "Hands off" and "Bullying" Policies apply at loading bays and whilst on the bus.
- 4. Throwing of any object within or out of the bus is banned, in all circumstances.
- 5. For travel on the College Charter buses, students must present a valid College Bus Pass.
- 6. Whilst travelling on any College Charter bus, all students must always remain seated and wear seatbelts if fitted to bus .
- 7. For travel on the College PTV buses, students must present a valid College Bus Pass **and** have a valid **MYKI** card in credit.
- 8. Boarding buses must be done in an orderly way students are required to queue and enter the bus one at a time.
- 9. Exiting a bus must be done in an orderly way; that is, one student at a time, observing normal safety requirements when crossing roads and to not move in front of or behind the bus, into the traffic.
- 10. Students are required to follow all directions given by bus drivers at any stage of the journey.
- 11. Students must follow health & safety directives including the wearing of masks when required.
- 12. If a bus driver considers that students are not following the directions, or are behaving in a manner, which is endangering the safety of others, the driver may return to the College, or stop the bus in a safe location and wait for further instructions from either the bus company or the College. Students are to fully cooperate with the driver in these circumstances.
- 13. The cost of repair for any damage to bus interiors will be referred to the students responsible.
- 14. Students who fail to cooperate with drivers or who do not meet the conditions of travel on the PTV or charter buses, should expect to receive consequences for their misbehaviour. In line with our restorative approach to behaviour management consequences could include; a restorative conference, exclusion from the bus, a travel ban, school detention and/or suspension from the College.

# What is a Federated Search?

A Federated Search retrieves information from a variety of sources via a search application built on top of one or more search engines. To perform a Federated Search, follow the instructions under 'Learnpaths' on the Learning Centre Homepage, or:

From the Learning Centre Homepage, click on "Search other sources" found to the right of the search bar.


